The Department for Education's recently released annual school performance tables show that Wolgarston High School's Sixth Form achieved the best A Level results in Staffordshire last year.

Wolgarston's high academic standards have continued to improve year on year, exceeding local and national averages. This achievement is testament to the hard work of both students and staff. Students experience high-quality teaching, exceptional support and wide ranging opportunities throughout their Sixth Form journey. The success at A Level is also mirrored at GCSE where the school achieved a very high progress score ensuring they were in the top 10% of schools nationally.

Speaking about the school's success, Wolgarston Headteacher Jo Fairclough, said:

"We are proud of our high expectations and believe that, with 100% effort and hard work, young people are capable of achieving great things. I am delighted that the Sixth Form results have ranked us top of Staffordshire and that Wolgarston continues it's track record of securing excellent outcomes.

#### Attendance



At Penk Valley Academy Trust, we know that excellent school attendance is necessary if academic outcomes are to be achieved. The more children are in school, the better their outcomes will be.

The vast majority of Penk Valley Academy Trust schools and pupils are above the national average due to the ongoing efforts of parents, students and staff. However, we also know that attendance rates are still not quite up to 2019 pre-Covid levels. We will continue to work together in order to support children, families and schools to achieve excellent attendance.

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#### **Menopause Training**



Over 33 million women in the UK at some stage in their life will experience menopause. Due to a lack of awareness among the public, a lack of training among some medical professionals and social stigma, the needs of women during this critical life change are frequently ignored, belittled or overlooked.

No two menopause stories are the same. This contributes to the lack of understanding. Some women transition smoothly without any major effects with others potentially suffering the most extreme symptoms and enduring a significant negative impact on their lives.

In February a certified Menopause Coach was invited to hold a Menopause Support Session for Trust staff where attendees learnt:-

- What happens during menopause and when it happens
- All about menopause symptoms...the ones you know and the ones you might not!
- Long term health risks associated with menopause
- Key lifestyle changes you can make to support you to make menopause more manageable

Organised by our Trust HR Team, staff found the session thought provoking and positive with information gained from the session helping to support individuals going through this experience.
